## THE INDISSOCIABLE NATURE OF SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT AND SOCIAL JUSTICE

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We are living in a critical moment for our species and for the planet. Never in our history have we been faced with such great challenges as the ones we actually caused, expressed in the changing climate and related disasters. The enormous volume of disposable plastic thrown out into nature, the excessive and unsustainable lifestyle of humanity, our dependence on fossile fuels, and other unsustainable actions have have their toll and are now coming back to haunt us. However, the impacts of climate change and disasters are not felt evenly around the world. Instead, it is mostly poor and developing nations which feel these impacts first and foremost, whereas rich and developed nations can handle such situations in a significantly less trumatic way. However, even in the midst of such a scenario, some people would prefer to ignore all alerts and maybe hide from climate change and temperature increases by turning on the air conditioner. That is a solution that cannot work. In Brazil, it is usually said that the problem of the semi-arid region of Brazil is "not seca but cerca", "not drought, but the fence", since as long as the fences of large monoculture farms exist and dominate the use of natural resources, including water, smallholder and family farmers will not

have sufficient access to grow their own crops.

So, what can we do to change this scenario of inequality and unsustainability? Is there a map to guide us in the path towards sustainability? There actually is. This map was provided to us by the United Nations 2030 Agenda that established the 17 Sustainable Development Goals.

Sustainability refers to the need of using natural resources in such a way that it does not compromise the ability of future generations to meed their own needs. In that regard, the UN 2020 Agenda has stated that the eradication of poverty is indispensable for sustainable development, that is, sustainable development requires a continuous effort on three different fronts: economic, social, and environmental. The future cannot be sustainable if the world is filled with poverty, hunger, lack of opportunities, and little cooperation.
